The Loblolly Pine



- ⇒ Leave are in 3-needle bunches, similar to the Long-leaf Pine. Loblolly needles are 6-7", where Long-Leaf can be up to 18"!
- ⇒ Loblolly Pines grow VERY FAST, so they are planted in large amounts and used for lumber and paper.
- ⇒ Loblolly Pines can grow up to 100' tall!
